


Family Day Home Providers

In May & June 2022, the Study of Early Education through Partnerships conducted a survey of early educators in Virginia working with children ages 0-5. A total of 198 home-based child care providers, typically referred to as "family day homes" in Virginia's licensing system, completed the 2022 survey, representing two-thirds (66%) of surveyed family day home providers. This profile describes those family day home providers.

Most family day home providers are people of color.

Nearly all family day home providers (98%) are female.


LANGUAGES SPOKEN

TEACHER AGE


Over half of family day home providers are over 50 years of age.

credential



Family day home providers have been teaching and caring for children at their site for an average of 14 years.







MENTAL HEALTH





SOCIAL SUPPORTS AND BENEFITS RECEIVED





JOB SATISFACTION


TEACHER RETENTION

Nearly all family day home providers (87%) said it was very likely they would still be at their site in 3 months, and about three-quarters said they expected to still be there in 3 years.



CAREER GOALS

Nearly all family day home providers view being an early childhood educator as their long-term career.



This survey was conducted as part of Virginia's Preschool Development Grant Birth through Five (PDG B-5) initiative, which aimed to improve the quality of early childhood care and education across Virginia. In this third and final pilot year before PDG B-5 was expanded statewide, early childhood sites in 86% of Virginia's cities and counties participated in PDG B-5.
