


Family Day Home Providers

In May & June 2023, the <u>Study of Early Education through Partnerships</u> conducted a survey of all early educators in Virginia working with children ages 0-5. A total of 367 home-based child care providers, typically referred to as "family day homes" in Virginia's licensing system, completed the 2023 survey, representing over half (52%) of surveyed family day home providers. This profile describes those family day home providers.




EDUCATION & EXPERIENCE


EDUCATION LEVEL

A quarter of family day home providers have a bachelor's degree.



Family day home providers have been teaching and caring for children at their site for an average of 14 years.





36% of family day home providers hold a CDA credential. 12% of family day home providers are working towards one.





54% of family day home providers received some kind of social support or benefit in the past month, including...




A quarter of family day home providers do not have health insurance from any source.

CAREER GOALS


Nearly all family day home providers view being an early childhood educator as their long-term career.

Nearly all family day home providers (85%) said it was very likely they would still be at their site in 3 months, and threequarters said they expected to still be there in 3 years.



All early childhood educators participating in VQB5, Virginia's Quality Measurement and Improvement system, were invited to complete the survey. All early childhood sites in Virginia that receive public funding are required to participate in VQB5.
